Course Title: Multimedia Literature and the Holocaust

Contact Hour Breakdown: CR 3 CLASS 3 LAB 0

Prerequisites: None

Course Designation: This course counts as an elective only; it does not meet any Humanities or Gordon Rule requirements.

Catalog Description: This course explores literary characteristics inherent in various media including (but not limited to) Holocaust-related historical text, documentary film, comics (graphic narrative), survivor narratives, pre-and post-Nazi art and contemporary major motion pictures. The examination includes critical analyses of textual, visual, syntactical, mechanical and thematic conventional similarities found in traditional textual "literature" and in the structure, syntax and language of visual media. This course now counts as an elective.

Major Topics/ Concepts/ Skills/ Issues

- Critically distinguish between fact and opinion
- Identify literary devices such as syntax, visual metaphors, and thematic focus in directorial use of the elements of mise-en-scene, framing and editing in topically related film
- Identify authorial use of literary devices in textual illustration to enhance textual narratives/messages
- Identify historical styles and literary devices including composition, syntax and symbolism in painting and focusing on those characteristics that dominate comparative artistic styles
- Identify similarities and differences between philosophical structures and philosophically motivated actions described in topically related personal narratives
- Identify major Holocaust-related themes presented in the images and narratives of Holocaust-related major motion pictures
- Write multiple college-level essays using primary and/or secondary source materials

Withdrawal Policy: Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance and Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the established deadline for a particular term will receive a grade of "W". A student is not permitted to withdraw after the withdrawal deadline of **April 6, 2018**. A faculty member **will** withdraw a student up to the beginning of the final exam period for violation of the class attendance policy. Online Course Policies & Participation: In order to be successful in improving communication skills, students must commit to regular and timely completion of assignments and discussions. They will learn from one another through class discussions; therefore, they should make it a habit to post the required assignments on time. Any more than three missing assignments may result in withdrawal from the course and loss of credit and tuition fees. Papers should be uploaded on time and before the deadline. Those turned in within 7 days after the deadline will be considered late. A 20% late penalty applies to late work within the seven days limit; this does not include the research paper and the final exam which should be completed on time to receive credit—no late research papers or final exams will be accepted. Any other discussions or assignments that are late more than 7 days will not receive any credit. This is an accelerated course, and I want you to be successful in it. I am sure that students want to pass this course and be successful, so my policies are a tool to assist you in realizing that work needs to be completed within the set deadlines. I am here to assist you in any way I can, but I need my students' commitment that they are devoted to this course as well. As the great majority of my students in the last fifteen years often expressed, it is this devotion to the course from my part and from your part as well that will help you reach your goal of success in this course while building your writing, reading, and critical thinking skills at the same time.

Online Course Conduct: Valencia College is dedicated not only to the advancement of knowledge and learning but also is concerned with the development of responsible personal and social conduct. By enrolling at Valencia College, a student assumes the responsibility for becoming familiar with and abiding by the general rules of conduct.
